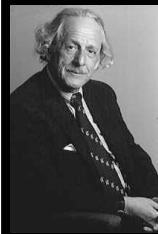

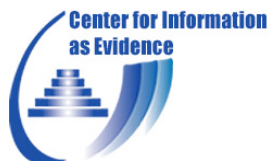
WINNER OF THIS YEAR'S LOS ANGELES CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN SOCIETY FOR INFORMATION SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY (LACASIS) **CONTRIBUTIONS TO INFORMATION SCIENCE AWARD**, DR. GARFIELD IS THE FOUNDER AND PRESIDENT OF ISI, PUBLISHER OF THE CITATION INDEX FOR THE SCIENCES, SOCIAL SCIENCES, AND ARTS AND HUMANITIES.

RICK PRELINGER, archivist, writer and filmmaker, founded Prelinger Archives, whose collection of 51,000 advertising, educational, industrial, and amateur films was acquired by the Library of Congress in 2002 after 20 years' operation. Rick has partnered with the Internet Archive to make 2,000 films from Prelinger Archives available online for free viewing, downloading and reuse. Prelinger has lectured widely on American cultural and social history and on issues of cultural and intellectual property access. He sits on the National Film Preservation Board as representative of the Association of Moving Image Archivists and is a board member of the Internet Archive and Board President of the San Francisco Cinematheque. Rick is co-founder of the Prelinger Library, an appropriation-friendly reference library located in San Francisco.

**THE ISI SAMUEL LAZEROW MEMORIAL LECTURE PROGRAM IS SPONSORED BY:
THOMSON SCIENTIFIC**

SAMUEL LAZEROW, in whose honor and memory this lecture series has been established, had a record of long and distinguished service in the library profession. An honors graduate of Johns Hopkins University, he received his library education at Columbia University. During World War II he served as the Army's chief library officer in Europe. Mr. Lazerow spent 25 years of service in the federal library community and held administrative posts at each of the three national libraries. From 1947 to 1952 he served as chief of acquisitions at the National Library of Agriculture and followed that with a similar assignment at the National Library of Medicine for thirteen years. In 1965 he joined the Library of Congress where he headed a task force on the automation and sharing of services between national libraries. He served as Vice President for the Institute for Scientific Information after his retirement in 1972 and held the post until his death. This lecture series was initiated by Dr. Eugene Garfield, founder and president of ISI, as a tribute to his friend and colleague.
